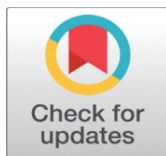
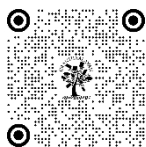


THE ROLE OF ECOTOURISM IN PROMOTING SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT
