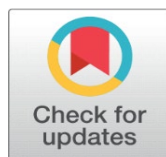
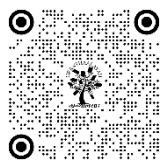


INDIA AND CHINA: CONFLICT AND COOPERATION

China's Belt and Road Initiative (BRI) has been viewed with suspicion by India, especially the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) that runs through Pakistan-occupied Kashmir. India has declined to participate in the BRI, arguing that it violates its sovereignty.

Furthermore, China's growing military presence in the Indian Ocean and its increasing ties with India's neighbors, such as Sri Lanka, Nepal, and Bangladesh, have been seen as efforts to encircle India strategically.

Economic Competition and Trade Imbalances: Although both India and China have seen rapid economic growth in recent decades, their economic relationship is filled with asymmetries. China is India's largest trading partner, but the trade balance is heavily tilted in China's favor, leading to concerns in India over its reliance on Chinese imports, particularly in the technology and manufacturing sectors. India's trade deficit with China remains an important issue in bilateral relations.

Additionally, India's growing technological and industrial capabilities are increasingly seen as a challenge to China's dominance in Asia. China, in turn, views India's rise as an obstacle to its vision of regional hegemony.

Geopolitical Alignments: India and China have different geopolitical alignments that often place them in opposing camps on the global stage. India is part of the Quad (Quadrilateral Security Dialogue) alongside the United States, Japan, and Australia, which seeks to counter China's growing influence in the Indo-Pacific region. Meanwhile, China is an active member of the Shanghai Cooperation Organization (SCO) and has cultivated close ties with Pakistan, India's rival.
